




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CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER'S MESSAGE



Bringing Care Closer to Home

On January 6, 2022, Lakeridge Health announced that the lands between Lake Ridge Road, Winchester Road, Highway 407, and Highway 412 located in Whitby had been selected as the preferred site for a proposed new hospital for Durham Region. The Town continues to advocate the provincial government to secure the required land commitment and Planning Grant for Lakeridge Health to move the process forward.

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#DurhamHealthMatters

The Town launched its #DurhamHealthMatters campaign to bring awareness to the need for more healthcare infrastructure, family doctors, and mental health services in Durham. Throughout the campaign, more than 12,000 people took the time to join the conversation on social media, while 4,000 people viewed the #DurhamHealthMatters webpage.



Expanded Programs for 55+ and Youth

In 2023, the Town expanded its recreation programming for youth and residents 55+, increasing enrollment in courses, leagues, and recreation events by 11 per cent. New pickleball, member, and virtual programs were also added.

Community Safety and Well-being

Whitby participated on the Region of Durham's Area Municipal Working Group to ensure representation of Whitby's needs and the collaborative implementation of the Region's Community Safety and Well-Being Plan.



Taking Action to Address Homelessness

The Town is taking action to address homelessness in the community by working with partners from across Durham to create a more integrated and accessible system of supports to help those in need. In 2023, a new Whitby Homelessness Task Force was created by the Town to focus and partner on several initiatives related to shelter, food insecurity, and other supports for those experiencing homelessness. The Town also worked with the Region to finalize an agreement for how the Region will operate its 1635 Dundas shelter.

Addressing Food Insecurity

In 2023, the Mayor's Community Development Fund provided Feed the Need with a \$15,000 Lead Grant to establish a marketplace model in Whitby, \$5,000 to We Grow Food's Edible Garden project, and \$5,000 to St. Mark's United Church Food & Benevolence Outreach Program. The Town also established the Whitby Food Security Network to share knowledge and strengthen the food security system for everyone, especially for vulnerable and at-risk individuals in Whitby. The network is a collective of non-profit agencies, charitable organizations, faith groups, individuals with lived experience, government, and others working to address food security in Whitby.

Fighting Local Hunger

In September, the Town along with the Region of Durham and area municipalities raised food and funds equivalent to more than 10,000 pounds of food (or 8,457 meals) for Feed the Need and local food banks – the result of a month-long food drive.

Parks and Recreation Master Plan Engagement

More than 4,000 people participated in the Town's engagement to inform the development of a new Parks and Recreation Master Plan. Feedback collected showed residents want to see more investment in the community's waterfront, beaches, parks, and open spaces. A draft Parks and Recreation Master Plan will be brought forward for Council and community input in 2024. The new Plan will play an important role in defining a vision, as well as long-term goals and objectives, for how the Town will continue to meet the recreational needs of our growing community well into the future.

Summer Camp Programs

In 2023, approximately 5,000 children were registered in the Town's Summer Camps and Playground Program. The Playground Program ran in eight local parks and was made possible by Canadian Tire Jumpstart.

Supporting Arts and Culture

In 2023, the Town supported a number of initiatives aimed at profiling local art and culture, including the Roebuck Street placemaking project featuring five local artists, installation of QR codes for the Whitby Arts Trail, and new Culture Pop-up series featuring a Whitby Paint Night and Sunset Tango evening with interactive dance lesson accompanied by live music at the Waterfront.

Whitby Fire and Emergency Services Annual Report

In 2023, WFES received and responded to 6,770 emergency calls. Other highlights contained in the report include the 5,678 visits firefighters made to homes as part of the Ever Alert Public Education program, the 982 conducted inspections and 33,996 hours of training undertaken by firefighters to ensure they are prepared to respond to any situation.

Roebuck Street Placemaking Project

For the second year, there was a temporary closure of Roebuck Street from June to September in Downtown Brooklin to facilitate the creation of placemaking opportunities. This year, the Town received 30 artist submissions through the Call for Artists and a total of five artists were selected to showcase their design in the public art projects associated with the space including the painting of a new road mural and painting of the concrete barriers.

Whitby Public Library

The Library continued to live its mission to be the community's Doorway to Discovery. New Discovery Zones were launched to provide learners, creators, and entrepreneurs a space to connect with tools, technology, and each other. The library was also host to a number of events including a forum that brought the community together to hear the voices of people with lived experience of homelessness and the award-winning Drag Queen Story Time.

Record-breaking Event Attendance

More than 75,000 residents and visitors came out to more than 50 events hosted by the Town and community event organizers – including National Indigenous People's Day, Canada Day, Movies in the Park, and the award-winning Brooklin Harvest Festival. These events were supported by more than 400 event volunteers.

Creating Safer Roads

The Town launched a new online mapping tool on Connect Whitby to gather resident feedback on where they think traffic calming should be considered. More than 900 pins were placed on the map to help identify a road or intersection where they have a traffic-related concern and share why they think the location would benefit from a traffic calming measure. Feedback collected, available budget, and location considerations will be used to develop the list of the ten local streets where a traffic calming measure will be proposed this year.

Building a More Connected Community

In 2023, the Town began construction on a new and major east-west roadway through south Brooklin – the Mid-Arterial Roadway – beginning with the section of road between Ashburn Road and east of Baldwin Street. The future roadway will help to support the future Whitby Sports Complex, new economic development opportunities, and imminent growth expected in the area. The road will include a multi-use path to support active transportation and roundabouts to calm traffic along the corridor.

Whitby Civic Recreation Complex Renovations

Renovations at the Whitby Civic Recreation Complex were completed in 2023, including extensive renovation work in the aquatic hall, new inclusive change rooms that improve access to aquatic programming for facility users of all ages and abilities, and a new multi-purpose programming space to meet the recreational needs of a growing community.

Corporate Energy Plan (Zero Carbon Whitby)

This plan – also known as Zero Carbon Whitby – creates a framework and opportunity for the Town to be a leader in the community to address the impacts of climate change, reduce GHG emissions, and respond to Whitby's declaration that climate change is an emergency. The plan includes short, medium and long-term action items. In 2023, Council approved one-time funding of \$721,080 to prioritize zero carbon projects and help the Town continue to achieve its short-term 2025 target of 20% GHG emissions reduction.

Sustainability Upgrades At Town Facilities

In 2023, several upgrades were made to the Town's facilities to improve sustainability, including the Town's first heat pump at 117 King Street and new roof-top air-source heat pumps at the Civic Recreation Complex, upgraded lighting in two Iroquois Park Sports Centre arenas to LEDs, a new electric high-efficiency furnace and boiler at other facilities, and more. All upgrades will help the Town to meet its Zero Carbon Whitby commitments.

Strengthening Climate Resiliency

The Town completed an important creek stabilization initiative along the Lynde Creek at Cochrane Street to mitigate the effects of climate change and erosion. Additionally, a modern snow storage containment/treatment facility was constructed in south Brooklin to reduce the Town's environmental footprint moving forward.

New Housing Options

The Town has committed to facilitating the development of 18,000 new homes by 2031, as mandated by the Province. In 2023, construction began on several mid- to high-rise residential buildings approved and supported by Council to increase the diversity of housing options in Whitby. Construction also continued on the two 18-storey towers at Garden and Taunton which will provide needed senior housing once complete, and townhouse developments in Brooklin and Port Whitby.

Road Resurfacing

The Town resurfaced 15.8 kilometres of roads in various locations throughout Whitby in 2023. The Town also upgraded 1.32 kilometers of sidewalk for greater accessibility as part of continued efforts to support active transportation needs.

Park Projects

Four new parks opened in West Whitby, including district parks Des Newman WhitBee Park and Lynde Creek Park and two local parks in the Chelsea Hill and Lazy Dolphin developments. Several park improvements were also completed, including the redevelopment of the Heydenshore Park splash pad. Grass Park and Phillips-Kozaroff Park also received significant upgrades, including the replacement of playground equipment to improve accessibility, usability, and beautification of the spaces.

Trail Upgrades and Connections

In 2023, the Town applied for and received a \$2.6 million grant from the federal government's Active Transportation Fund to support the construction of the new Corbett Creek pedestrian bridge and boardwalk, and reconstruction of the existing asphalt trail to improve accessibility. Resurfacing and accessibility improvements, including 14 new benches, were also completed on existing trails. The Lynde Creek Trail connecting Lynde Creek Park to Fruitful Crescent was completed within West Whitby, with an additional 500 metres of trail underway to connect to Twin Streams Road.

Whitby Food Guide

The Town published the second edition of the Whitby Food Guide, profiling and promoting local culinary businesses. The digital guide was viewed more than 12,000 times, a 300 per cent increase over 2022. The Food

Guide was nationally recognized for marketing excellence with the top Marketing Canada Award for a single publication from the Economic Developers Association of Canada.

Station No. 3

Brookfield Residential continued construction on Station No. 3, a six-storey, mixed-use condominium at the corner of Brock and Colborne Streets. The project is the biggest development to come to downtown Whitby in more than 30 years.

Town Brewery Pop-up

The Town supported the opening of the Town Brewery waterfront pop-up at the historic Pump House building, helping to make the waterfront more vibrant and welcoming for residents and visitors alike. The pop-up is expected to be open seasonally for the next four years.

Economic Development Strategy

This five-year strategy aims to foster and support economic growth in Whitby. The plan focuses on four pillars to support existing businesses and attract new investment: strengthen economic development capacity; become storytellers; embrace and inspire community economic development; and foster municipal innovation. In 2023, key actions included the implementation of the Business Retention and Expansion Program, creating new content for a monthly e-newsletter profiling local businesses and available Town supports, updated semi-annual economic indicators and jobs report; and a live economic indicators page. The Strategy will continue to be implemented in 2024.

Partnering to Support Local

The Town worked collaboratively with the Downtown Whitby Business Improvement Area (BIA), and Whitby Chamber of Commerce, and Business Advisory Centre Durham (BACD) on a number of initiatives and events aimed at supporting local businesses. This included the My Main Street Local Business Accelerator Program, Façade Improvement Grants, and more.

Whitby Tourism Strategy and Actions

More than 80 per cent of the action items in Whitby's four-year Tourism Strategy are now complete. In 2023, these included the launch of a new tourism website and Instagram channel (@ExploreWhitby) to promote Whitby attractions and businesses, launch of the tourism brand "Discover something new to enjoy"; Destination Development and visitor attraction networking events and more. Implementation of the Strategy will continue in 2024 and beyond.

Support for Local Organizations

Each year, through the Mayor's Community Development Fund and the Performing Arts Community Development Fund, the Town is proud to support a number of local organizations that have a positive impact on the community. In 2023, these Community Development Funds provided over \$235,000 in grants to 62 community organizations.

Expanded Community Services Department

The Town's Community Services Department was expanded to include the Town's Operations Division. This brought the majority of Whitby's resident facing services under one department, providing more seamless service delivery to the community. These services range from recreational programming to parks planning and maintenance, to roads maintenance, to storm water management, and more.

Citizen Budget Tool

In 2023, a record nearly 12,000 people engaged in the budget process. Feedback was again collected through the Citizen Budget Tool, which included a budget simulator and encouraged residents to share their budget priorities by creating their own ideal budget. New to the engagement, the Tool incorporated a participatory budget question, which asked residents to select one of five possible priorities that they would dedicate \$100,000 towards. Family physician recruitment, economic development and job creation, and traffic calming were selected as the top priorities. As a result, a \$75,000 investment in Family Physician Recruitment was included in the proposed 2024 Budget. The amount was reduced from the initial \$100,000 to respond to budget pressures.



Connect Whitby

The Town continued to engage the community through its Connect Whitby digital engagement platform. Connect Whitby makes it easy for residents to learn more about and participate in all of the Town's open engagement opportunities, enabling residents to be part of the municipal decision-making process. To date, the site has been visited more than 177,000 times, with visitors participating in nearly 50 projects. In 2024, the platform will continue to be utilized to listen to, learn from and involve the community in Town projects.

Employee and Labour Relations

Facilitating effective employee and labour relations are critical to the Town and its diverse working environment comprised of approximately 1,000 employees. In 2023, a new collective agreement with CUPE Local 53, Full-time was negotiated and ratified.

Supporting The Community Through Partnerships

In 2023, Town staff maximized federal and provincial grant opportunities, resulting in increased services for residents. Successful grant funding has been received for 11 applications in 2023 resulting in a total value of nearly \$3,300,000. These funds support Town programs and services, including the planning for active transportation, sustainability projects, downtowns and special events, and many agefriendly programs for residents 55+.

New Market Food Bank

The Town and Feed the Need in Durham are taking action to address food insecurity in the community. Last year, Whitby Council approved a new partnership between the two organizations which will see 1,000-feet of space at Iroquois Park Sports Centre dedicated to the operation of a new market-style food bank. The goal: to provide a more accessible, dignified, and equitable way for individuals to access food bank services and healthy food options in a community setting. The market is expected to open in Spring 2024.

Calming Traffic in Whitby

In 2024, the Town will continue to implement a number of traffic calming measures in various locations throughout Whitby to create a slower, safer community. These include the construction of permanent speed humps on at least six streets, as well as permanent speed feedback signs (LED signs that display a drivers' speed) and flexible on-street posts located near two elementary schools. The Town will also test a raised intersection to support safety and walkability. The Town will also use the feedback received through the Connect Whitby mapping exercise to identify additional streets for traffic calming initiatives.

2024 Special Events

The Town's 2024 special events calendar will include Canada Day, the award-winning Brooklin Harvest Festival, Culture and Holiday Pop-Ups in local neighbourhoods, summer programming, Whitby Lights the Night, and more. Engagement will also begin to determine a new signature event for Whitby. All Town-led events will continue to have a pointed focus on inclusivity and active transportation, and special efforts will be made to create programming for audiences of all ages and cultural backgrounds.

Use of E-mobility

In 2024, the Town will engage the community on the use of various modes of e-mobility, including e-bikes and e-scooters. The engagement will ask for input on where and how these modes of transportation could be used in Whitby.

Supporting Community Gardens

The Town will continue to support the establishment of community gardens. In 2023, a community group set up the first community garden located on Town property at King Street Park. In 2024, community engagement will be undertaken to inform the possible development of a new community garden at the Civic Recreation Complex.

Constructing a New Whitby Sports Complex

Construction will continue on the new Whitby Sports Complex in 2024. Environmental sustainability initiatives incorporated into the facility's design will make it the first Zero Carbon building and LEED Gold facility in Canada to include a twin pad arena, gymnasium, and aquatics facility. The 13-acre outdoor park neighbouring the facility is also planned to include pickleball, tennis, and basketball courts; a multi-purpose sports field; a playground; as well as a skatepark and pump track. Together, the facility's amenities will help to create a multi-purpose gathering space for inclusive sport and community programming - a place for residents of all ages and abilities to connect, play and get active.

New Trail Projects

Several new trails are planned for construction in 2024. These include additional trail sections in West Whitby following the Lynde Creek between Bonacord Avenue and Rossland Road, and north of Twin Streams Road, as well as Waterfront Trail improvements. Overall, more than three kilometres of new trail will be constructed and/or rehabilitated.



Public Art Policy

A new proposed Public Art Policy will be brought forward for Council approval in early 2024. The proposed policy will provide a standardized process to support and grow public art projects in Whitby. The proposed Policy is based on feedback collected from local and regional art experts, and nearly 200 survey participants, as well as a comparator analysis of best practices from over 15 municipalities in Durham, Ontario, and Canada. As a key action item in Whitby's Culture Plan, the policy will play a role in helping to animate public spaces through public art for the enjoyment of all residents and visitors.

Park Projects

In 2024, seven playground refurbishments will be undertaken in Rotary Centennial Park, Powell Park, Glen Ayr Park, Sato Park, Vipond Park, College Downs Park, and D'Hillier Park North to improve accessibility for all residents. The basketball court in Baycliffe Park and the splashpad in Cachet Park will also be renovated to improve the use of both spaces.

2024 PRIORITIES

New Fire Station in West Whitby

Construction of a new fire station to serve the residents of West Whitby will begin in 2024. The new station will provide added fire and emergency services in the newly developed area.

Downtown Whitby Brock Street Design Study

A study will be undertaken to review Brock Street from Highway 401 to the CP Railway Bridge. The study will assess the current street conditions (road, sidewalks, on-street parking, trees, etc.) and obtain public feedback on what types of changes the community would like to see to create a more pedestrian friendly street that is accessible for all ages, respects the cultural heritage in Downtown Whitby and creates opportunities for sustainable design. The study will result in a design plan that will be used to make future upgrades to the Brock Street corridor.

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations

The Town will continue to support its sustainability goals with the installation of eight new Electric Vehicle (EV) charging stations at various facilities, including at Town Hall, Iroquois Park Sports Centre, and the Whitby municipal parking lot on Green Street in Downtown Whitby.

Road Resurfacing

More than 18 lane kilometres of roads will be resurfaced in various locations throughout Whitby in 2024.

Infrastructure Renewal

In 2024, the Town will begin the replacement of the nearly 100-year old White Bridge on Columbus Road with a new modern structure which will support the continued growth and expansion in Brooklin. The Town will also continue its effort to improve Water Street through the anticipated completion of its Environmental Assessment, with the goal of transforming the Whitby waterfront into a destination of choice for all.

Climate Emergency Response Plan

The Town will continue work on Whitby's Climate Emergency Response Plan (CERP) to provide a framework and action items for how the Town will address both climate change mitigation and adaptation. The outcomes of the Plan will outline how Whitby will work towards the Council-endorsed greenhouse gas reduction of 100% by the year 2045. In 2023, Council approved Phase 2 – Mitigation of the CERP with implementation to begin in early-2024.

Improving Access to Family Physicians

The Town and Oshawa Clinic Group are partnering to improve resident access to family physicians. Through a pilot program launched in 2023, up to 10 family physicians will be provided with an incentive of \$50,000 over a five-year term, funding for which will be equally shared between the Town and the Oshawa Clinic Group. The physicians will work out of the new Whitby Health Centre, expected to open in summer 2024.

Establish a Local Business Week

A new, Whitby specific Local Business Week will be established by the Town in 2024. Over the course of a week, representatives from across the municipality will be meeting with local businesses to discuss challenges and opportunities to doing business in Whitby. It will be an opportunity to build relationships and celebrate the local business community.

Food and Brewery Tours

In 2024, the Town will work with local restaurants and businesses featured in the award-winning Whitby Food Guide to offer new Food and Brewery Tours.

Growing Our Local Economy

Whitby is home to a growing number of technology, service, commercial and world-class entertainment and tourism related businesses. In 2023, approximately 20 new businesses opened in Whitby, including The Springwood, Amray Fine Foods, Snacks by Sarah, The Station Bakery, and more. In 2024, the Town will continue to focus on attracting and supporting new businesses moving into the community.

Community Job Fair

Working with local businesses, the Town will host a new community job fair for members of the community with special focus on providing support to new Canadians, the BIPOC community, individuals with a disability, and other groups to ensure equity.

Zoning for the Future

The Town will present a new recommended Comprehensive Zoning By-law for additional community feedback and Council approval in 2024. The new By-law will update Whitby's three current Zoning By-laws and combine them into one easy-to-read document. The goal: to create a new zoning by-law to manage land use and future development. Having one zoning by-law will make it easier for residents, developers and others to find information they are looking for.



Digital Engagement

Connect Whitby, will continue to serve as a centralized tool to coordinate and promote all of the Town's engagement opportunities.

Building Whitby's Budget

Opportunities for residents, businesses, and community partners to be part of the municipal budget planning process will continue to be promoted through Connect Whitby and others channels.

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Supporting Diversity and Inclusion

Work will continue on initiatives and programs that celebrate and support diversity and inclusion in the community. The focus in 2024 will be on implementing the internal facing action items from the IDEA (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Anti-Racism) Project, building a strong corporate foundation to ensure an inclusive and equitable workplace in support of inclusive and equitable services for our community.

2024 Community Survey

The Town is committed to being an open and inclusive organization that is responsive to the needs and concerns of its residents. In 2024, the Town will undertake its biennial Community Survey to gauge resident satisfaction.

Organizational Effectiveness


The Town will continue to focus on strengthening Organizational Effectiveness through the strategic alignment of people, process, and technology. The focus for 2024 will be to continue to establish modern and inclusive Talent Management practices, facilitating continuous improvement, improving health and wellness supports and programs, and implementing hybrid work models to support the new world at work. Process improvement projects will be supported by technology and leading people, communication, and change management practices for transformation projects such as the Enterprise Resources Planning (ERP-Project WISDOM) project. Communications efforts will be focused on reaching even more people to openly share information, engagement opportunities, and Whitby's stories.

Enterprise Resource Planning System

Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) facilitates the flow of information across a corporation. At the Town, the system will enable staff to have a more holistic view of the organization and better support informed and timely decision-making as it relates to financial, asset and human resource management. The full implementation of the technology is a multi-year process that will continue in 2024.




Responsible Financial Management

The Town's primary funding source is property tax which represents one-third of the total property tax bill. Other funding sources include user charges from various recreation programs, licensing fees, funding from other levels of government, and investment income.






