





On behalf of the dedicated women and men of Whitby Fire and Emergency Services (WFES), we are pleased to present the Annual Report for 2022 and 2023.

WFES is a proud organization serving the Town of Whitby and its citizens since 1851. Utilizing innovation, leadership and education we are dedicated to protecting the lives and property of our citizens through the reactive emergency response operations of fire suppression, rescue and emergency medical care and the proactive measures of fire prevention, inspections, code enforcement and life safety education.

WFES is the second-largest fire department in Durham Region, with 144 employees serving a population of 141,000, and protecting 146 km². Whitby also includes the community of Brooklin, with each having its own traditional downtown core, high and low density residential areas, large commercial and industrial business districts, and significant dedicated parkland and green spaces. Major transportation routes such as the Ontario Provincial highways 401, 407 and 412, in addition to the four (4) railways that pass through Whitby. Whitby is also home to two (2) large recreational marinas and is bordered to the south by 13kms of Lake Ontario shoreline.

WFES is structured into five (5) divisions each staffed by dedicated, highly trained, motivated staff. The Town of Whitby values the commitment and efforts our staff members make on a daily basis to support those in need alongside our partner emergency responders from Durham Region Paramedic Services and the Durham Regional Police Services. Each division within WFES is critical to our collective success. These divisions include:

- Suppression
- Professional Development and Training
- Risk Management and Education
- Asset Management
- Administration

WFES has a long standing history of providing quality service and programs to the community. We stand committed to expanding on this tradition in our future endeavors through collaborative community interaction with the Mayor and Council, the CAO and Town Senior Leadership as well as the Whitby Professional Firefighters Association Local 2036 in order to provide enhanced delivery of emergency services.

In closing, as always we remain “Ever Alert”, positioned to respond to your needs while adhering to our core values of compassion, integrity and excellence.



Whitby Fire at a Glance



Suppression

- Comprised of 124 personnel who respond to emergency calls on a 24/7 basis. When not responding to calls, they spend much of their time delivering public education programs, engaging in daily training activities, and maintaining equipment.

Risk Management and Education

- Comprised of 7 personnel tasked with fire code inspections, plans examination and inspection of new fire safety systems, public education program development, delivery, coordination and training.

Professional Development and Training

- Consists of 3 personnel who are responsible for keeping the Department on the leading edge of emergency-related knowledge and techniques, as well as ensuring that WFES personnel are equipped with the skills and abilities to provide the highest level of quality services to the public.

Administration

- Houses 8 personnel including the Fire Chief, 2 Deputy Chiefs, 1 Manager of Administration, 3 Fire Services Clerks, and 1 Asset Management Coordinator. Administration provides the strategic direction for the Department and coordinates and processes the information needed to keep the Department operating effectively and efficiently.

The Work We Do

Innovation



In June 2023, WFES proudly put into active service the new Command Vehicle, Car 35. This vehicle harnesses the latest technological improvements that will increase our Platoon Chief’s situational awareness and provide the interior organized space to effectively manage emergency incidents when operating as a Command Post.

WFES also made multiple tool and equipment improvements, as well as improvements within our specialty rescue disciplines. A significant investment was made to our Water and Ice rescue program, including the purchase of new Mustang Hudson suits and associated apparel, inflatable RitCraft, reach pole and rescue sled.



Following training and community partnerships, in November 2023, WFES equipped all fire vehicles with Sensory Support Kits. Each kit includes noise-reducing ear covers, fidget items, tinted safety glasses, comforting stuffed bears and more. Tactile and sensory items play a crucial role in supporting self-regulation and avoiding sensory triggers.

The innovative and updated equipment allows WFES to better serve the residents and visitors of our community.

Reducing risk is always an internal priority at WFES. Through a grant from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation of Canada, WFES was awarded \$47,634 to purchase Solo Rescue Decon washers. These machines allow firefighters to thoroughly wash their SCBA equipment, while protecting the electronic components of the gear. An SCBA washing machine also ensures post fire carcinogens are removed in an effective way to help prevent cancers.



Finally, in 2023, WFES had a complete replacement of our portable radio fleet as the previous equipment had reached its end of life cycle. With this purchase, WFES moved towards NFPA compliance for exposed components of the radios. This certification means that these components will withstand higher temperatures at a fire scene and provide effective communication in the event of an emergency. As a further improvement to emergency communications, WFES expanded our radio fleet to include our Emergency Operations Centre. This addition provides another layer of communication in the event of a cellular failure during an emergency.

Education

In March 2022, WFES partnered with Maddox Media to film a new video series documenting the diverse careers within the Fire Service. These informative videos were posted on our social media channels and showcased multiple divisions including Risk Management & Education, Suppression and Professional Development & Training.



On June 3, 2023 WFES celebrated Acting Platoon Chiefs Craig Sluman, Jon Sharkey, Mark Kennedy and Acting Chief Training Officer Bob Brandon on their completion of NFPA 1021 Fire Officer III. WFES hosted this course through our Regional Training Center. Congratulations to all attendees.



Four (4) WFES firefighters spent a week in Fall 2022 at the Fire House Expo in Columbus Ohio, where they learned and took part in modern firefighting strategies and tactics training for emergency responses.



Finally, in 2022 WFES purchased a propane car fire prop from Kirila Fire based out of Ohio. This prop has provided WFES staff the ability to effectively train on one of our more frequent “bread and butter” fires. Fires with this prop can be used to simulate both a traditional combustion engine car fire, in addition to a fire in an electric vehicle.



In 2023, our Professional Development & Training division had the opportunity to train our firefighters using acquired structures on Garrard Road, Columbus Road West and on Ashburn Road. In addition, we hosted firefighter training using Laser Maxx’s facility.

These acquired structures and training opportunities provides firefighters invaluable hands-on experience to develop new strategies and/or fine tune existing skills as it relates to strategic and tactical emergency responses.

Training scenarios within these structures included rural water supply strategies on deployment, VEIS (Vent,Enter,Isolate,Search) evolutions, search and rescue, RIT (Rapid Intervention Team) and roof operations.



In 2023 WFES reinvigorated its' Regional Training Centre (RTC) delivery with the Ontario Fire College. As an RTC, Whitby Fire & Emergency Services will host and facilitate education and training as part of the OFC curriculum. WFES plans to host fire services from across the province when delivering the following courses in 2024:

- Courtroom Procedures
- NFPA 1521 ISO Blended
- NFPA 1006 Water Rescue Blended
- NFPA 1006 Auto Extraction Blended
- NFPA 1035 Fire Life Safety Educator II

Our Risk Management & Education division has continued to make advancements in providing overall service levels both internally and externally. Our new Public Education Officer focuses on the development and coordination of educational programs that have been able to reach over 11,000 homes during our “Ever Alert” campaign. WFES also provided fire safety education to over 4,000 local elementary schools, station tours to 166 people and connect with over 8,000 people at community events.



In addition, Risk Management & Education continues to partner with Suppression in multiple ways, such as familiarization tours in large complex buildings prior to occupancy. With the increasing complexity and interconnection of life safety systems, providing familiarization of these buildings and systems continues to be a priority of WFES. To foster continues learning, we have also collaborated with Technology & Information Services to implement virtual tours for the less complex buildings.

Following numerous nominations from his peers, Platoon Chief John Harrison was selected as the inaugural recipient of the Bob Mowat Leadership Award.



Congratulations to Bob and John and thank you for your dedicated service to WFES and the community.




Emergency Response Boundaries



Emergency Response Statistics


Response Summary

WFES responded to 4,363 emergency calls in 2022 and 6,864 emergency calls in 2023: representing a **57.3%** increase in call volume year over year.




Response Breakdown

WFES experienced a **4.6%** increase, year over year, in fire and alarm calls and **139.6%** increase, year over year, in medical calls. Furthermore, in 2023 WFES responded to 9.3% more motor vehicle collisions in comparison to 2022.




Fire Response Data

WFES responded to 284 fire incidents in 2022, representing 6.5% of overall call volume and in 2023, WFES responded to 280 fire incidents, representing 4.1% of overall call volume. Fire incidents are defined as fires/explosions structural and non-structural.



The overall fire incidents in 2022 included 42 residential structure fires with dollar loss and in 2023 included 55 residential structure fires with dollar loss. Based on the incidents, 2023 experienced a **30.9%** increase in residential fires in comparison to the previous year.




Notable Anniversaries - August 2022
