Cynthia Davis, President and CEO, and Chris Squire, Health System Executive, Corporate Services and Chief Financial Officer, Lakeridge Health appeared before Council and provided a presentation about Lakeridge Health's Annual Update. Highlights of the presentation included:

- an update about the status of a new hospital for Durham Region;
- the first anniversary of the Jerry Coughlan Health & Wellness Centre and the number of procedures performed at the facility;

- an overview of the Queen's-Lakeridge Health MD Family Medicine Program including the status of the cohorts participating in the program;
- partnerships between Lakeridge Health and CAMH and between Lakeridge Health and Grandview Kids and how these partnerships will help strengthen care options in Durham Region;
- Lakeridge Health's ongoing strategic planning for 2026 to 2031 including focusing on hospitals as community anchors, future health trends, technology in health care, and providing primary care to residents in Durham Region;
- the upcoming Ride for the Ridge cycling event supporting Lakeridge Health taking place on May 25, 2025; and,
- details about Lakeridge Health's upcoming Annual General Meeting on June 19, 2025.

A question and answer period ensued between Members of Council, Ms. Davis, and Mr. Squire regarding:

- the approach and timelines recommended by Lakeridge Health regarding fundraising for the new hospital for Durham Region; and,
- details about the pre-capital submission process required by the Province for new hospital facilities, the applications submitted by Lakeridge Health, and potential timelines for construction of new health care facilities in Durham Region and within Whitby.
- 6.2 Hubert Schillings and Ronald Death, Members, Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee (In-Person Attendance)

Re: Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee (DAAC) Community Outreach

Hubert Schillings and Ronald Death, Members, Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee appeared before Council and provided a presentation about the Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee (DAAC), and their community outreach efforts. Highlights of the presentation included:

 an overview of the mandate and composition of DAAC, including providing advice to the Region of Durham on agricultural and rural matters;

- details about agricultural activity in Durham Region, including 1,200 operating farms;
- activities undertaken by DAAC in 2024 including supporting the On-Farm Diversified Uses Project;
- issues facing the agricultural community in Durham Region including backyard chickens and Avian Influenza, stormwater management fees, the cost of agricultural lands, and a shortage of local meat processing facilities; and,
- examples of how DAAC can be a resource and liaison between Durham Region and agricultural businesses.

A question and answer period ensued between Members of Council, Mr. Schillings, Mr. Death, and Staff regarding:

- the keeping of backyard chickens, concerns around attracting coyotes, and potential impacts to commercial egg farmers;
- challenges experienced by local farmers with regulations related to conservation, soil movement, and construction of lodging for temporary workers;
- how Durham Region would benefit from additional local meat processing facilities;
- the impact of tariffs on the agricultural sector including the potential for rising costs for parts and farm equipment;
- opportunities to improve consistency in planning and development processes between local municipalities in the Region;
- sustainable energy options for the agricultural sector and how renewable energy is being used by farms in the Region;
- opportunities for the Region and the Town to support the agricultural sector by advocating for the development of meat processing facilities in the area; and,
- how planning and development Staff at the local municipalities can work together to support the agricultural sector.
